

Across Tottenham communities are working together to improve our neighbourhoods and protect the facilities that matter to us. This map highlights some of the on-going campaigns and just a few of the many success stories.



North Tottenham

Swathes of affordable housing and many local businesses are set to be lost or priced out to make way for a new chainstore-led retail & leisure 'destination' with an expanded new Spurs stadium at its centre. The Love Lane Estate is resisting demolition to make way for an unnecessary walkway connecting Spurs stadium and the train station.

Further to the west, a 25yr long residents' campaign has so far succeeded in saving Bull Lane Playing Fields and have developed their own plans to improve the site for sports.

Central Tottenham

Broadwater Farm Estate and Lordship Recare two areas which have seen successful community-led regeneration efforts. The estate was transformed throughout the 1990s, and the adjacent park has just completed a £5m makeover showing that great things can be achieved when the community is in the driving seat.

On the other side of the High Road, Lord Morrison Hall is one of a number of community centres under threat of eviction.

South Tottenham

The Wards Corner Community Coalition are opposing the demolition of homes and businesses on a block above Seven Sisters Tube. Since 2007 the community has organised many large public meetings, delayed the developers plans, taken the Council to court and produced a community-led vision for the site.

Following a hugely successful campaign Everybody's Music was saved from closure.

To the west, there are concerns that St Ann's Hospital faces the sell off of much of the site for housing.
